ATTENTION MOTHERS!

Do you have a baby or toddler under three? Want seven hours a week parenting your child?

Early Head Start offers a bi-weekly opportunity for incarcerated mothers and their children to strengthen their relationship and to preserve the bond of attachment while separated. Mothers gain hands-on parenting experience while their children learn through play and exploration.

Early Head Start is a national program established in 1995 to promote healthy prenatal outcomes, enhance the development
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of infants and toddlers, and promote healthy family functioning. The mission of the Early Head Start program at Coffee Creek is to promote, strengthen and support bonding and attachment between infants and toddlers and their incarcerated mothers.

Requirements:

- Child aged zero to three
- Minimum or minimum eligible with gate clearance
- Child lives less than 60 minutes away
- Transportation to and from the school (not provided by EHS) Tues/Thurs 9-12:30

TACE

The Wilsonville Rotary is again bringing Through a Child's Eyes (TACE) to Coffee Creek. TACE is an outside summer children's event held in July that features a BBQ as well as interactive crafts, games and other activities for mothers and their children to participate in together. The 2017 TACE event will mark the 15th year that the Wilsonville Rotary and CCCF have partnered to provide this unique opportunity for inmates and their children. The dates and times are as follows:

Medium Facility
Saturday, July 8th
11:30 am – 3:30 pm
Afternoon visiting cancelled in both facilities

Minimum Facility*
Sunday, July 9th
11:30 am – 3:30 pm

Afternoon visiting cancelled in both facilities along with Sunday morning.

***Please note:** Again both events this year will take place in the Medium facility. Medium inmates will participate on Saturday. On Sunday, Minimum inmates will be escorted to the Medium Facility for the event. Please notify your families that they will need to come to the Medium Facility regardless of whether you are currently in Minimum.

Who is eligible? You may attend the event if you meet all of the following criteria:

- You have children ages 17 and under who are approved on your visiting list or approved to attend special visiting and will attend with a caregiver, **and;**
- You are incentive level 2 or 3
- No major DR's in the last 6 months
- **You must meet these requirements by June 22nd in order to qualify for the event.**

What visitors can come? Inmates may invite **their own children** ages 17 and under who are also on the inmate's approved visiting list (or approved for special events). They are to be accompanied by an adult caregiver who is also on the inmate's approved visiting list. The number of caregivers allowed will be determined based on the number of children attending.

Special Note: Children of the adult caregivers may also attend if they are on the inmates approved visiting list and living in the same household as the inmate's children. You must note this on your application in the "Relationship to Inmate" section.

How to apply: Fill out the application form that is available on your housing unit and send it to **Mrs. Mooney**. We will verify that those you have invited are on your approved visiting lists or have been previously approved to attend special events. Late requests will not be processed, so act now! **Applications received after Friday, June 9th will not be processed.**

Once the request is processed, Mrs. Mooney will send all approved inmates a notification of approved guests as well as an invitation to the event (printed by the Rotary TACE program) for the inmate to send to her approved family members. Mrs. Mooney will also make sure you are on the call out for the orientation meeting and the event.

How to volunteer if you're children do not come? If you meet the above criteria and you do not have children that will be attending the event, you may apply to work as a volunteer at the event. Inmate volunteers will be screened and selected to meet the needs of the event based on the number of children attending. Inmates that volunteer must

also meet the incentive level requirements listed above. **If you do not have children coming** and want to volunteer to help at the TACE event, please send an inmate communication to Mrs. Mooney no later than June 10th. Volunteers are typically needed in the following areas: Food Service, Hair Braiding, Face Painting, and Bussing/Cleaning. If you are able to braid hair or face paint please indicate that specifically on your kyte.

Transportation and lodging assistance for families: The Rotary Club may consider assisting with transportation costs(75 miles +) and lodging if needed for caregivers to bring children to this event in July. Assistance will be reviewed and approved on a case-by-case basis. ***Please do not request this assistance unless it is absolutely necessary.*** Applications for transportation assistance are available in the housing units.

Some things to remember:

- Visitors must already be approved. If you have not already started the process it will more than likely be too late for this event. You should get started now, however, because there will be another children's event coming up in the fall. If your children and caregivers are not on your approved visiting list by June 23rd you will not be able to participate in this event.
- If you are approved for this event, you will be given an invitation to mail to your children and caregivers to attend the event.
- If it is your responsibility to notify your family if they have been approved and to invite them. If family members show up who have not been approved, they will not be allowed into the facility. **There will be no exceptions.**
- Inmates on LOP will not be able to participate and it will be your responsibility to notify your children and caregivers.
- This event is for the children. A great deal of time, energy, effort and money has been invested by the Wilsonville Rotary and their volunteers. **Please help to make this event fun, safe and successful for all who attend.**

Frequently Asked Questions

Question: I am currently incentive level 1. May I still participate?

Answer: It is possible. For this event you must meet the incentive level requirement (2/3) by June 22nd. In other

words, if you are currently a level 1, but will be a 2 or 3 on or before June 22nd, you should submit an application. If you reach level 2 or 3 after June 22nd, but before the event date, you will not be able to participate and you should not submit an application. If you are unsure your counselor can provide you with that information.

Question: I recently arrived at CCCF am on intake status. Am I able to participate?

Answer: Possibly. In order to participate in this event you must be off intake status. If you are on intake status you are at level 2. In addition, in order to participate, your children and caregivers must be approved on your visiting list. This process is facilitated by your institution counselor once you are off intake status. We hold children's events four times a year, so if you are currently on intake status, you can work towards participating in the fall and winter events.

Question: I have other children on my visiting list who I want to invite (nieces, nephews, brothers, sisters, etc). Can I invite them?

Answer: It depends. The children's events are designed for inmates to spend time and interact with their own children; so generally, it is only those children who may attend. However, if your children are under the care of the same caregiver as the other children on your visiting list (grandchildren, nieces, nephews etc.) and they reside in the **same household**, you may invite your children and the other children. The situation will be verified by your counselor and Lifeskills staff.

Question: I have been to many children's events in the past. Do I still need to attend the pre-event meeting?

Answer: Yes. Everyone who signs up is required to attend this meeting. If you do not attend you will not be able to participate in the event.

Question: I have been approved for the event but I just found out that my family will not be able to make it. Do I need to notify anyone?

Answer: Yes. If you have applied and been approved for the event and find out that your family cannot come, please send an inmate communication to Mr. Randall as soon as possible. It helps in planning if we have the most accurate number of attendees as possible.

The Taylor's Checkerspot Butterfly Program is on schedule and will be a win for the butterfly's survival as CCCF plays an important role in increasing butterfly populations in their native land. We are joining efforts with Oregon Zoo's butterfly recovery lab with our own recovery lab on H Unit and G/H Yard. The new addition of an endangered species recovery program supports our commitment to environmental awareness and responsibility as stated in our **Mission Statement:**

Coffee Creek Correctional Facility is mindful of our use of the earth's natural resources and our impact on the environment. As members of a community we commit ourselves to environmental awareness and responsibility. We align our actions to promote sustainability.

Our recycling contributions benefit those near and far. We've sent 7.95 tons of footwear to **Shoes for a Cure in Florida whose efforts provide Disaster relief to victims of hardship.** They receive our shipments separating the salvageable shoes from the unsalvageable shoes to give them to those in need. Upcoming Changes to the Commissary Forms:

Due to some operational changes and suggestions we received from the adults in custody, we have made some changes to the commissary form. These forms will be out soon.

Holiday Section

We have removed the holiday section from the backside of the commissary form. We will use a separate form for holidays.

Greeting cards section

We have removed the list of cards and provided space for you to write in the event, age, and gender of the card you want. **For example:** Birthday, youth, male

Alternative Canteen form

We will no longer use a separate form for alternative items. These items have been added to the backside of the commissary form.

Promotional and Holiday Items

We have heard you loud and clear regarding the lack of opportunity to purchase promotional/holiday items. Beginning with this summer promotional period (July-September), Commissary will limit purchase quantities until everyone has had equal opportunity to purchase these items. The limits will be clearly marked on the commissary form. Please note, these limits may change periodically depending on supply and demand.

TWO YEAR RENEWALS - VISITING

From DOC

Inmate Services Unit (ISU) technicians are completing a visitor clean-up project by completing background reviews

on all visitors 15 years and older that have been on your visiting list for two years or longer. Additionally, per Oregon Administrative Rule 291-127-0285 on Visiting (Inmate), any visitor that hasn't visited in the previous **two years** will be removed from the inmate's list unless ISU is notified otherwise.

We ask that you consider **waiting until your visitor is ready to visit** before adding them back to your list. Our visiting application process is very streamlined, so we can complete most applications within a week of receipt unless there is some background issue. This will also help keep your visiting list updated and accurate, and ensure new applications continue to be processed as quickly as possible.

What this means:

1. On May 15, 2017, any visitor that has not visited in the past two years will be automatically removed from your visiting list.
2. You will receive notifications of visitors that are removed. Again, we recommend you reapply when your visitor is ready to visit.
3. ISU Technicians will focus on completing background checks on all visitors on your visiting list for two years or longer, who are still visiting.
4. You will be notified if a visitor is found to no longer be eligible to visit.

The Inmate Services Unit knows how important it is for you to connect with your family and friends, mentors, and support. We want to help make this clean-up project as smooth as possible, so please share this information with your visitors.

The library is currently taking applications for one legal assistant position. The **required** qualifications are as follows:

- High school diploma or GED
- Computer skills, preferably Microsoft Word
- Ability to communicate verbally and in written form
- Exceptional attention to detail
- Acceptable institution record of demeanor. This means clear conduct (no major or minor DRs for at least 6 months, and that you have been serving time at Coffee Creek for at least 6 months.
- Typing skills at 40 words per minute
- Able to stand for periods of time, lift books/boxes, and climb stepstool.
- Minimum of 2 years left to serve in Medium
- Ability to work under pressure and take direction.
- Ability to maintain good working relationships with the library coordinator, other inmate workers and library users

Women who speak and write both Spanish and English fluently or those who have previous work experience in the legal field are especially encouraged to apply. If you are interested in this position, send an application to the library. Your application must be received in the library no later than May 24, 2017.

LEISURE LIBRARY

Effective immediately, if you have excess books checked out, you will not be allowed to check out any item from the leisure library. If you have overdue books, you will not be allowed to check out more items. If you have excess books, they must ALL be returned before you will be allowed to check out more. If you have overdue books, you must return ALL items. I review the list kept at the checkout desk and have approved the denial of this privileged service.

The book return boxes are emptied Monday afternoon, Wednesday afternoon and Friday morning. If you have excess or overdue books, we need to have the books checked in by the time you come to the library. You may drop the books in the return boxes in time for us to check in the books, or you may bring the books with you when you come in.

NEW ARRIVALS TO MINIMUM

From Capt. M. McCorkhill, Minimum Operations

Every Friday at 1pm in your unit dayroom will be a mandatory meeting for arrivals to minimum for that week. You will meet your Peer Educators for your unit.

There seems to be some confusion regarding tablet use. Not adhering to the following directives will result in disciplinary action:

TABLETS

From Lt. Wall

Only one tablet per inmate may be checked out at a time, and may only check out tablets for themselves. At no time are inmates authorized to take more than one tablet from the docking station.

The inmate checking out the tablet must leave their ID to indicate they are in possession of the tablet.

During count time and when day rooms are closed for the night, all tablets must be returned to the docking stations. Inmates may only use their own log in information when using the tablets. Using another inmate's pin/profile is prohibited.

Tablets may be used for up to two hours at a time.

When not in use the tablet must be checked back in. Inmates may not hold on to a tablet if they are not using it at that time.

Inmates may not leave the tablets unattended at any time when they are checked out to them.

When on Loss of Privilege (LOP) status inmates are not allowed to use the tablets.

When inmates receive a Conduct Order (cell-in) they may not use the tablets until the conduct order has ended.

EYEGLOSS PROGRAM WANTS YOU

From Mr. Bradley, Education

As of Monday, April 17th, Eyeglass is still accepting applications for the optical program.

This is a 14-month work-based education program that starts at 6 PRAS points per day, progressing to 14 points by program end. The first half of each day is spent studying curriculum about Opticianry and the other portion of the day is spent recycling eyeglasses for the Lions Clubs overseas sight missions. There is also opportunity to gain experience on the optical finishing lab, producing glasses for adults living in Oregon correctional facilities.

REQUIREMENTS:

- Willing and able to pay \$100.00 towards your Certified Paraoptometric (CPO) Examination by May 2018.
- Commitment to work Monday-Friday 8:00am - 2:45pm as well as the occasional evening and weekend.
- High School Diploma or GED.
- CASAS test math score of 236 and reading score of 242, or ability to achieve these scores within six months of entering the program.
- Minimum 6 months at Coffee Creek Correctional Facility prior to applying.
- Housed in minimum facility general population.
- Release date after June 2018 to allow time to complete the program
- Self-motivation to work hard, study in class and independently on your unit, and pass frequent quizzes

Upon completion of the program, subject to passing the CPO examination, you will receive certification from the American Board of Opticianry as a Certified Paraoptometric. If you are interested in pursuing a career in the optical profession please submit a job application and a KYTE explaining why you would like to be considered for the optical program, as soon as possible. Eyeglass staff will be hiring up to 10 more workers before June 1st, 2017. Please place your completed KYTE and application in the Education KYTE box.

MINIMUM MOVES

From Lt. Wall, Minimum Lieutenant

Inmates living on F300 are there on an incentive basis. Bunks in that unit are at a premium as there is limited space, and there are additional privileges that come with living there. If you receive a bottom bunk restriction, and you live in F300 on a top bunk, you will be moved to another unit to accommodate your restriction. If you wish to move back to F300, you may submit an incentive move request that notes that you wish to be moved back to the unit, and you are bottom bunk restricted.

If you are moved from the minimum to the medium facility, out to court over night, etc. your bunk in the minimum will not be held for you, even if it was the bunk you were moved to for your incentive move. Coffee Creek is near maximum capacity and other inmates will be moved to the minimum while you are gone. Once you return, you may submit an incentive move request to go back to the unit you previously lived in. However, you will not be guaranteed the same bunk.

Whenever submitting an incentive move request, please review the guidelines for moves in the inmate handbook on your housing unit. Coffee Creek management reserves the right to approve or deny move requests based on facility needs and security concerns. If you have questions about moves in the minimum, please contact Lieutenant Wall.
