Once you have submitted an application, whether it was hand written or on the kiosk, please do not keep re-submitting applications for the same visitor. The process for a visitor application can take up to 6 to 8 weeks. Once the visitor is approved or denied, you will receive notification of the application status. Submitting more than one application per visitor is not productive and will not speed up the process.

PREA HOTLINE CALLS

From DOC

We have received some reports of Inspector General PREA hotline calls being disconnected inadvertently by the telephone provider. If this has and /or does happen to you please contact the Inspector General's office and/or Institution PREA Compliance Manager and inform us of the approximate date/time of the occurrence. Currently the Inspector General hotlines only accept a maximum of three minutes on recording. Currently, once that three minute limit is reached, you will hear a message that says "your call has been disconnected". This means the message has been sent.

DOC is committed to providing multiple reporting methods. You can also report by:

- Reporting directly to any staff member, contractor or volunteer

Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA Information)

The Oregon Department of Corrections (ODOC) has a zero tolerance policy for sexual abuse, sexual harassment and for retaliation for reporting an incident. You may report in person to any staff, through an inmate communication, through the grievance system, by calling the PREA hotline by dialing 9 from any inmate phone.

Filing an Anonymous PREA Report

If you are uneasy about filing a PREA allegation, you may file an anonymous report with an outside agency.

Please indicate in the beginning of your letter you are filing a PREA allegation and you are requesting to remain anonymous. The Governor's Office will refer all anonymous allegations to the DOC PREA Coordinator to assure an investigation is completed based off the information that is provided.

Community-Based PREA Advocacy (Support) Program

ODOC has partnered with community based, confidential advocates of sexual abuse victims to provide services to inmates.

Inmates at ODOC who have experienced sexual abuse may reach a community-based advocate by dialing 711 inmate telephone systems, or may request a private call through the PREA Compliance Manager at the facility. Advocates provide victims of sexual abuse information about their options, resources, information and emotional support. There is no charge for calls to advocates.

Role of an Advocate:

- ☞ Provide confidential support and crisis intervention
- ☞ Inform you about the investigation and medical examination process
- ☞ Educate you about healing from sexual abuse
- ☞ Offer resources and referrals

Advocates will:

- ☞ Not tell you what to do
- ☞ Not communicate with the institution unless you request them to do so and sign a release
- ☞ Not provide legal advice

Community-based advocacy centers provide sexual abuse support to people of all genders. Community-based advocates will not report unless you request them to do so and if you sign a release of information.

DOC is committed to providing inmates with avenues to seek assistance. Below are additional resources:

PREA Audit

The Coffee Creek Correctional Facility will be undergoing an audit for compliance with the United States Department of Justice's National PREA Standards to Prevent, Detect, and Respond to Prison Rape under the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) for Prisons and Jail standards during the following period:

***CONFIDENTIALITY** – All written and verbal correspondence and disclosures provided to the designated auditor are confidential and will not be disclosed unless required by law. There are exceptions when confidentiality must be legally breached. Exceptions include, but are not limited to the following:

- if the person is an immediate danger to her/himself or others (e.g. suicide or homicide);
- allegations of suspected of child abuse, neglect or maltreatment;
- in legal proceedings where information has been subpoenaed by a court of appropriate jurisdiction.

ATTENTION MOTHERS!

Do you have a baby or toddler under three? Want seven hours a week parenting your child?

Early Head Start offers a bi-weekly opportunity for incarcerated mothers and their children to strengthen their relationship and to preserve the bond of attachment while separated. Mothers gain hands-on parenting experience while their children learn through play and exploration.

Early Head Start is a national program established in 1995 to promote healthy prenatal outcomes, enhance the development of infants and toddlers, and promote healthy family functioning. The mission of the Early Head Start program at Coffee Creek is to promote, strengthen and support bonding and attachment between infants and toddlers and their incarcerated mothers.

Requirements:

- Child aged zero to three
- Minimum or minimum eligible with gate clearance
- Child lives less than 60 minutes away
- Transportation to and from the school (not provided by EHS) Tues/Thurs 9-12:30

BIRTH CERTIFICATES AND SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS

From DOC

Many already know how important it is to have your birth certificate and social security card, but it's worth repeating and even "kyting" about. Aside from the benefits of having your birth certificate while you're still inside, both pieces of identification are essential to your success after release because they are needed to get a job, open a bank account or cast a check, and apply for state or military benefits.

As you approach your release, if the DOC does not have a birth certificate or social security card on file for you and if you may be eligible to receive one provided by the DOC, you will receive a kyte from the institution records office. Those approaching age 65 will also be sent a kyte if the DIC does not have a birth certificate on record. The kyte will tell you which piece of identification is missing and give you the means to start the application process. Just fill in the information and forward the kyte to your institution records office. It's as simple as that!

NOTE: To eliminate duplications that could delay your application process, please complete and return only one each of the birth certificate and social security card kyte forms.

SUSTAINABILITY NEWS

From Green Team

This coming Winter will help prepare animals and nature to pause their ordinary way of springtime and summertime life to recharge, refresh and renew for the coming Spring; just as CCCF's butterfly guests undergo their own state of diapause before developing into beautiful Taylor's Checkerspot butterflies. Diapause is a time of suspended development in the butterfly or other animal during unfavorable environmental conditions. The outside storage units on G/H Yard were specifically made for this process.

Seasonal changes do bring a time of regrowth, hibernation and more, but recent fires and floods viewed on the news are devastating. Families are suffering as homes, towns and nature disappears under the strain of natural disasters. This time of difficulty for others reminds us why it is so important to save natural resources and help the earth as much as possible. Environmental havoc is increasing and will not be solved overnight, but we make an impact when we step up and take responsibility as stewards of this precious planet. Recycling containers are provided around the Unit and on Cell-Sanitation Carts. Take just a moment and help ease the suffering that future natural disasters are bound to bring.

Thanks to Clothing Room efforts along with the Recycle Center, we were able to supply the **Salem Sleeping Bag Project** with over 90 wool blankets. These recycled blankets are used for filler to insulate sleeping bags donated to homeless people in the Salem area. We were also part of shipping out 38,500 lbs. of fabric to **Blue Jeans Go Green**, an environmental company creating useful products by upcycling.

LEGAL CLERK WANTED

The library is currently taking applications for a legal clerk position. The **required** qualifications are as follows:

- High school diploma or GED
- Computer skills, preferably Microsoft Word
- Ability to communicate verbally and in written form
- Exceptional attention to detail
- Acceptable institution record of demeanor. This means clear conduct (no major OR minor infractions) for at least 6 months, and that you have been serving time at Coffee Creek for at least 6 months this incarceration.
- Typing skills at 40 words per minute
- Minimum of 2 years left to serve in Medium
- Ability to work under pressure and take direction.
- Ability to maintain good working relationships with the library coordinator, other inmate workers and library users
- No computer fraud crimes in your history
- No misconduct reports of misuse of equipment systems

Women who speak and write both Spanish and English fluently or those who have previous work experience in the legal field are especially encouraged to apply. If you are interested in this position, complete an application on your unit and send it to Ms. Wheeler. Your application must be received by November 6, 2017.

VERY IMPORTANT LIBRARY NOTES

From Ms. Wheeler, Library Coordinator

1. Library workers do not work 24 hours a day. They have been given a direct order to not discuss legal work on the units. If you have an urgent issue, please ask your unit officer to call the library.
2. DO NOT leave books on top of the book return boxes. You may earn a permanent ban from the library if this practice is continued.
3. Leave ONLY library books in the book return boxes. You may earn consequences from Education or the Chapel.
4. We have many people who have overdue library books and excess library books (more than 5 items). Effective December 1, 2017, you will not be allowed to check out books if you have overdue

or excess items. We need to have the book(s) in our hands before you will be allowed this privilege again. This means we will not accept "I put it in the book return box" as a way to be allowed to check out a book.

Law Library notes:

1. You **MUST** put your schedule on your kyte when you are requesting a law library appointment. If you do not, your kyte will be returned unanswered.
2. Effective December 1, 2017, we will no longer provide loaners, unless you are in special housing. You may request an appointment to come review information on the inmate network and take notes, or you may print items and pay for them at \$0.10 per page. You **MUST** have money in your trust account for this print.

Typical duties of the orderly are as follows: General cleaning of the office including kitchen, restrooms, dusting of the conference room and cleaning offices as needed. Sweeping, mopping and buffing floors; emptying trash; and helping with various clerical office projects as needed. You must be an incentive Level **3** and have a minimum of **6 months** clear conduct to apply.
