NEW LEGAL AFFAIRS RULE

On September 1, 2017 the department will permanently adopt a new Legal Affairs (Inmate) Rule 291-139. The major revisions are as follows:

Prioritization System: The new rule defines Priority Legal Users and General Legal Users. Access to law library services and equipment will be available to all users on a prioritized basis using these two new categories in combination with the existence of an imminent court deadline.

Standardization of Forms and Processes: New CD forms have been made to standardize practice across state facilities and provide Library Coordinators the information

they need to expedite your requests. With this comes the retirement of some previous forms and guides including the Secure Word Manual.

Clarification on Indigence: Two categories of inmates will qualify for indigent status. Priority Legal Users are one category and the other is General Legal Users with imminent court deadlines. The latter category is more narrowly defined and spelled out in the rule.

Printing and Photocopying: Prior to this rule implementation, some facilities practiced 'first print is free.' This practice is a relic from a time when the department transitioned from type writers to word processors. With the implementation of the new rule, all facilities are required to charge a fee of 10 cents per page for every print or photocopy. Indigent copies and supplies will be provided as defined by rule.

Additionally you will find clarification in the new rule on the use of external storage devices (thumb drives), receipt of electronic media from attorneys and transport of your property when you transfer or leave custody.

We encourage you to read the new rule on legal affairs and communicate with your Library Coordinators through this transition. Questions specific to the new standardization of processes and rule language can be addressed to Kelly Raths, Central Law Library Administrator, Dome Building, Salem.

Thank you to all of you who submitted comments as part of the rule making process, several comments were incorporated into the final rule. The previous Legal Affairs Rule had been in place for two decades. The new rule provides timely clarification on legal affairs practices and introduces new structural frameworks for access to legal library resources.

VISITING APPLICATIONS

Once you have submitted an application, whether it was hand written or on the kiosk, please do not keep re-submitting applications for the same visitor. The

process for a visitor application takes roughly one week. Once the visitor is approved or denied, you will receive notification of the application status. Submitting more than one application per visitor is not productive and will not speed up the process.

Early Head Start offers a bi-weekly opportunity for incarcerated mothers and their children to strengthen their relationship and to preserve the bond of attachment while separated. Mothers gain hands-on parenting experience while their children learn through play and exploration.

Early Head Start is a national program established in 1995 to promote healthy prenatal outcomes, enhance the development of infants and toddlers, and promote healthy family functioning. The mission of the Early Head Start program at Coffee Creek is to promote, strengthen and support bonding and attachment between infants and toddlers and their incarcerated mothers.

Requirements:

- Child aged zero to three
- Minimum or minimum eligible with gate clearance
- Child lives less than 60 minutes away
- Transportation to and from the school (not provided by EHS) Tues/Thurs 9-12:30

If an inmate is on Loss of Privileges status, then they should not be utilizing the Telmate Kiosks.

The Telmate Kiosks are closed at 9:00pm and inmates should not be scheduling visits any later than that.

Inmates should not be scheduling video visits during their normal work hours. Video visits are not a reason to leave work.

Video visits are only to be scheduled during times that the dayrooms are normally scheduled to be open.

During a level 2 lockdown if an inmate has a video visit that was scheduled prior to the beginning of the lockdown, these video visits will still be allowed to take place during the lockdown.

COFFEE CART UPDATE

Coffee Cart Notice: For the month of September the Coffee Cart will have limited hours. It will only be open Friday through Monday.

CCCF revisited the practice of breast feeding for visitors. If an outside visitor is requesting to feed her baby in the visiting room, she is allowed as long as she is covering up by using a baby blanket or towel if she does not have a blanket.

APPAREL

In order to maintain a positive environment for all inmates and visitors, a reasonable clothing standard must be established. Visitors are encouraged to wear clothing that is conservative in nature in order to maintain a respectful visiting environment. Some types of clothing may be prohibited to maintain the security of the facility.

1. Visitors are not allowed to wear blue denim or clothing (blue or lime green T-shirts or blue chambray/denim shirts) that is similar to inmate attire. Children eight years of age and under are not subject to the following clothing restrictions, other than undergarments.
2. Dresses, skirts, jumpers, culottes, and shorts shall not be worn more than two inches above the middle of the kneecap. Slit dresses/skirts shall be permitted only if the slit is not more than two inches above the middle of the kneecap.
3. Clothing that exposes an undue amount of flesh (e.g., exposing chest, back, thighs, or midsection) or clothing that is unduly suggestive or is FORM FITTING is prohibited. Examples of clothing that will be prohibited include: halter tops/dress, tube tops, see-through clothing, sheer fabrics, mini-skirts, shirts with low cut neck lines, wrap-around skirts, leggings, spandex pants/capris, and crop tops.
4. Visitors are required to wear undergarments.
5. Umbrellas, hats, outer garments such as raincoats, ski jackets and other garments that protect against rain and other inclement weather can either be hung on the coat rack provided or secured in a locker.
6. Light-weight sweaters, jackets, and/or sport/suit coats are permitted, but must be worn by the visitor during the entire visiting session. Hooded sweatshirts and lined jackets/coats are permitted.
7. Footwear must be worn.
8. Clothing, hairstyles, insignias or other paraphernalia associated with security threat groups or that create undue attention or conflict are prohibited; i.e., camouflage clothing, slogans, and suggestive or controversial statements. Camouflage clothing is prohibited.
9. Areas of the body that have body piercings or undergarments with an underwire often alarm metal detectors and may delay or even prevent visiting. Visitors may be asked to remove body piercings or jewelry to expedite the screening process.
10. Visitors who wear clothing that contains metal (this includes underwire bras and rivets) that prevents a visitor from passing through the metal detector will:
 - Be given one warning
 - Any future events will result in denial of entry.

****Any visitor who exhibits indication of the use of alcohol, narcotics, or other intoxicants shall not be permitted to visit.***

SAFETY

- All people are warned that there are inherent safety and security risks in visiting a correctional facility and the possibilities of personal assault or of being taken hostage do exist.
- If an emergency occurs, visitors are expected to stop and listen for instructions from the staff in the area. One of the first things to expect is the separation of inmates and visitors. Visitors must comply with all instructions.
- The Oregon Department of Corrections has a zero- tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse.

OCE / DOC Training Opportunity 12/4/17 – 3/29/18

OCE is recruiting to fill 18 open positions in the Textiles Program at CCCF. This four month program will include training in the following:

- Sewing
- Embroidery
- Quilting Basics
- Personal financial budgeting
- Job survival skills (soft skills)

The program will include self-study and hands-on training. Tests will be given in both written and demonstration formats.

Two shifts are available, 9 positions each, 1) Monday- Friday 6:30a .m. - 10:30 a.m. and 2) Monday- Friday 10:30 a.m.-3:30p.m. Those in the second shift will eat lunch in the workforce area. Please note: most weeks will have a Monday through Thursday schedule. Tentative start date 12/4/17.

This position awards 8 PRAS Points.

All applicants must meet the following qualifications:

- **For Medium Inmates Only:** Must have or be actively pursuing a GED or High School Diploma

For all inmates:

- **Must have at least 6 months clear conduct/six months at CCCF.**
- Be current with institution programming.
- Must have a release date after APRIL, 2018 - preference will be given to those closest to release or AIP.
- Preference will be given to those with moderate to high ACRS.
- Must be able to sit up to four hours at a time.
- Must not have any activities which would conflict with the training schedule.
- Be able to train professionally at all times. If you currently work for CDC, must have completed 12 month commitment.
- If accepted into the program, you will be required to sign a commitment agreement to complete the program. Those choosing to quit the program will receive a program failure.

All applicants will need to pass a counselor review, security screening, and OCE interview before being considered for the position.

Submittal process: If you are interested in applying, please submit a completed DOC Inmate Work Application to Mr. Conway, OCE General Manager. List "Textiles" as the position of interest. Applications must be received by 9/20/17.

OCE/DMV Work Opportunity

The OCE/DMV Call Center at CCCF is recruiting to fill open positions (position numbers to be determined) and also to establish a pool of candidates for future openings with the DMV Program. The work schedule is Monday- Friday, 8:00am to 5:00pm. This position awards 12 to 17 PRAS Points, with the opportunity to earn a production-based Team Goal Award as well. Future, *additional* openings are *anticipated* in the winter of 2018 but are subject to change dependent upon the needs of the DMV.

All applicants must meet the following qualifications:

- **Must have a valid social security number or equivalent**
- **Have NO current convictions for ID Theft, Fraud and Computer related crimes or in previous 10 years**
- **Must have a GED or High School Diploma**
- **Have at least 6 months clear conduct**
- **Have NO program failures in the past 6 months**
- **Must have a release date *after January, 2023* on your current sentence**
- **Lifers welcome to apply!**
- **Be able to read and speak English language well.**
- **Bi-lingual Spanish-English- Preference will be given to those individuals who speak and write both English and Spanish well.**
- **Be able to work efficiently and professionally at all times.**

All applicants will need to pass a security screening, application review and DMV interview before being considered for the position.
