Submitting more than one application per visitor is not productive and will not speed up the process.

SEE'S CANDY FUNDRAISER

Life Skills is holding a fundraiser to raise money for *Faubion School*. The school is a Pk-8th grade school with approximately 750 students. The school has an ethnically diverse population that is mostly low income, Title 1, where all students qualify for free breakfast and about 85% or more of the student body qualifies for free and reduced lunch. The school tries to work with the community and other supports to gather supplies needed for families. They also run a clothing closet on campus and could use supplies for the clothing closet as well. You must be a level 2 or 3 to participate. No Cell-ins, LOPS or disciplinary housing can participate. If for any reason you are unable to participate you will not be refunded and your money will be considered a donation. If you wish to donate to the fundraiser and not purchase candy you can do so. Orders must be submitted by 2/12/2018. Candy will be delivered 2/26/2018.

You will be able to order up to 4 items. The items include 1 lb. box of Assorted Chocolates, 1 lb. box of Nuts and Chews Chocolates, 1/2 lb. of Peppermint Patties and 1/2 lb. of Marshmallow Chocolates.

Does Earning a GED Impact Sentence Computation?

From Mr. Bradley, Education Director

Answer: According to Ms. Petersen, Prison Term Analyst Manager, earning a GED can impact sentence computation. The impact is based on the date of the crime (not the sentencing date). If the date of the crime is after July 1st of 2015, then earning a GED has no impact on sentence length. However, if the date of the crime is before July 1st, 2015, a GED completer may earn up to 60 days, but only if they have lost time. In other words, for those who have not lost any time, no time can be earned back. Petersen emphasized that the best thing for someone to do if they have a question about sentence computation is to kyte their Prison Term Analyst (PTA). The PTA's know all of the factors and can give a reliable answer.

The Commissary and Central Trust Unit will be closed or running on a limited capacity during the week of January 15 – 19.

The department's current Commissary and Central Trust accounting systems will be upgraded the week of January 15th. The upgrade will provide improved functionality to the Commissary and Central Trust Unit which in turn will provide improved customer service for our inmates and staff.

During the conversion process the Commissaries will be closed or running at limited capacity during the entire week. Please check your local institution for your commissary's operating schedule.

The Central Trust Unit and local institution Business Offices will be unable to process any financial transactions like CD-28's or check request on behalf of the inmate population until the conversion is complete. Please plan ahead if you have any important transactions you need to process.

BIRTH CERTIFICATE AND SOCIAL SECURITY CARD KYTES DEJA VU

If you declined applying for either a replacement birth certificate or social security card between April 2017 and November 15, 2017, you will probably start receiving the automated kytes again. This is because we were part of the pilot program, and in implementing it statewide, an overlap in the pilot and statewide institutions' cut-off dates caused the previously declined automated kytes to restart.

If you receive another kyte and have already declined, you have the following options:

- Do nothing and continue to receive the kytes each month.
- Complete the kyte and submit it to Records to apply for the replacement ID, which will stop the kytes.
- Check the box to decline to apply for the replacement ID (again) and send it to Records, which will stop the kytes.

Early Head Start is a national program established in 1995 to promote healthy prenatal outcomes, enhance the development of infants and toddlers, and promote healthy family functioning. The mission of the Early Head Start program at Coffee Creek is to promote, strengthen and support bonding and attachment between infants and toddlers and their incarcerated mothers.

Requirements:

- Child aged zero to three
- Minimum or minimum eligible with gate clearance
- Child lives less than 60 minutes away

- Transportation to and from the school (not provided by EHS) Tues/Thurs 9-12:30

BIRTH CERTIFICATES AND SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS

From DOC

Many already know how important it is to have your birth certificate and social security card, but it's worth repeating and even "kyting" about. Aside from the benefits of having your birth certificate while you're still inside, both pieces of identification are essential to your success after release because they are needed to get a job, open a bank account or cast a check, and apply for state or military benefits.

As you approach your release, if the DOC does not have a birth certificate or social security card on file for you and if you may be eligible to receive one provided by the DOC, you will receive a kyte from the institution records office. Those approaching age 65 will also be sent a kyte if the DIC does not have a birth certificate on record. The kyte will tell you which piece of identification is missing and give you the means to start the application process. Just fill in the information and forward the kyte to your institution records office. It's as simple as that!

NOTE: To eliminate duplications that could delay your application process, please complete and return only one each of the birth certificate and social security card kyte forms.

The HerStory Oregon Survey wants to hear from as many of you as possible about your experiences with Oregon's criminal justice system and about who you are. Your collective voices will help the public better understand who Oregon is incarcerating, how women are experiencing the criminal justice system, and what reforms may be needed.

Your stories will be gathered through a two-part survey. In November and December 2017, many of you participated in Part 1 and shared about your life at the time of arrest and your experiences from arrest to sentencing. This February and March, we want to hear from women in Part 2 of our survey, which will have questions about your experiences in prison, your feelings about release, and your past life experiences. **Even if you missed Part 1, you can still participate in Part 2.** We welcome as many women as are interested.

The information we gather from you will be used to create ideas for change and be used in materials for community education and reform efforts. There will be food and a small thank you for all survey participants. Come to an information session to learn more.

This is a project of the Oregon Justice Resource Center's Women's Justice Project in collaboration with the Department of Criminology & Criminal Justice of Portland State University.

ADL WORKERS NEEDED

Are you looking for a new job? Are you a kind, caring, compassionate person? Are you looking for a way to help others and give back? Are you respectful and responsible? CCCF is currently accepting applications for ADL Worker positions. Activities of daily living (ADL's) are day to day activities like walking or pushing a wheelchair, bathing, dressing, feeding, and toileting that some inmates may not be able to do on their own; they require assistance.

In order to be considered for this position you must be housed in the Medium facility, have 6 months clear conduct and no program failures in the last 6 months. You must also have at least one year remaining of your sentence, and be physically able to lift with no medical restrictions. We are looking for individuals who communicate well with others, are patient, and respect the need for confidentiality. If you

are interested in an ADL Worker position, pick up and complete an Inmate Work Application on your unit. Address your completed application to Health Services Nurse Manager and submit by placing in the Health Services kyte box on your unit. Applications received will be screened by Inmate Work Programs (IWP). Applicants who meet the minimum qualifications may be scheduled and called out for an interview. Thanks for your interest.

VERY IMPORTANT LIBRARY NOTES

From Ms. Wheeler, Library Coordinator

1. Library workers do not work 24 hours a day. They have been given a direct order to not discuss legal work on the units. If you have an urgent issue, please ask your unit officer to call the library.
2. DO NOT leave books on top of the book return boxes. You may earn a permanent ban from the library if this practice is continued.
3. Leave ONLY library books in the book return boxes. You may earn consequences from Education or the Chapel.
4. We have many people who have overdue library books and excess library books (more than 5 items). Effective December 1, 2017, you will not be allowed to check out books if you have overdue or excess items. We need to have the book(s) in our hands before you will be allowed this privilege again. This means we will not accept "I put it in the book return box" as a way to be allowed to check out a book.
5. We are making a change to the leisure library schedule. Effective November 27, 2017, we will call G/H on Tuesday morning, C/D Tuesday afternoon and J/K on Thursday morning. I realize this will create some work conflicts, and I am on top of worker line requests. I appreciate your patience as we try this new schedule.

Law Library notes:

1. You MUST put your schedule on your kyte when you are requesting a law library appointment. If you do not, your kyte will be returned unanswered.
2. Effective December 1, 2017, we will no longer provide loaners, unless you are in special housing. You may request an appointment to come review information on the inmate network and take notes, or you may print items and pay for them at \$0.10 per page. You MUST have money in your trust account for this print.
3. If the library is closed, your appointment will be rescheduled. There is no need to send another kyte.
