PREA HOTLINE CALLS

From DOC

We have received some reports of Inspector General PREA hotline calls being disconnected inadvertently by the telephone provider. If this has and /or does happen to you please contact the Inspector General's office and/or Institution PREA Compliance Manager and inform us of the approximate date/time of the occurrence. Currently the Inspector General hotlines only accept a maximum of three minutes on recording. Currently, once that three minute limit is reached, you will hear a message that says "your call has been disconnected". This means the message has been sent.

DOC is committed to providing multiple reporting methods. You can also report by:

- Reporting directly to any staff member, contractor or volunteer

Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA Information)

The Oregon Department of Corrections (ODOC) has a zero tolerance policy for sexual abuse, sexual harassment and for retaliation for reporting an incident. You may report in person to any staff, through an inmate communication, through the grievance system, by calling the PREA hotline by dialing 9 from any inmate phone.

Filing an Anonymous PREA Report

If you are uneasy about filing a PREA allegation, you may file an anonymous report with an outside agency.

Please indicate in the beginning of your letter you are filing a PREA allegation and you are requesting to remain anonymous. The Governor's Office will refer all anonymous allegations to the DOC PREA Coordinator to assure an investigation is completed based off the information that is provided.

Community-Based PREA Advocacy (Support) Program

ODOC has partnered with community based, confidential advocates of sexual abuse victims to provide services to inmates.

Inmates at ODOC who have experienced sexual abuse may reach a community-based advocate by dialing 711 inmate telephone systems, or may request a private call through the PREA Compliance Manager at the facility. Advocates provide victims of sexual abuse information about their options, resources, information and emotional support. There is no charge for calls to advocates.

Role of an Advocate:

- Provide confidential support and crisis intervention
- Inform you about the investigation and medical examination process
- Educate you about healing from sexual abuse
- Offer resources and referrals

Advocates will:

- Not tell you what to do
- Not communicate with the institution unless you request them to do so and sign a release
- Not provide legal advice

Community-based advocacy centers provide sexual abuse support to people of all genders. Community-based advocates will not report unless you request them to do so and if you sign a release of information.

DOC is committed to providing inmates with avenues to seek assistance. Below are additional resources:

Congratulations to all of our Survival Coaches for completing a 40 hour training in Peer Support. These women selflessly volunteer their time and hold a space of support for you. The next time you see them congratulate them. This program has grown significantly since it first started. I am proud to announce that we now have two Survival Coaches who are housed in the minimum facility. The minimum Survival Coach Program will become effective January 1, 2018; Ms. Fechter (Dorm 400) and Ms. Miller (Dorm 100)

Unlike the medium facility where each Survival Coach has a schedule the Survival Coach program in the minimum will only operate on an "on call" basis. If you are housed in the minimum facility and would like to speak with a Survival Coach you need to make a request with your Unit Officer. If the Officer approves your request the Survival Coach will be called to come to you. You are not allowed to go to their housing unit. If you do so you are in an unauthorized area and will be held accountable.

ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATIONS

From DOC

Effective January 1, 2018, the Adult in Custody populations in each location will have the ability to send inmate communications (kites) to Inmate Financial Services staff. The inmate communication form will be available for electronic submission using the Telmate Station (kiosk) or tablet and available under the inmate requests tab.

- Adults in Custody should use this communication tool to address questions and concerns associated their inmate trust account.
- Adults in Custody without access to Telmate Stations and tablets will continue to use paper inmate communication forms (CD214).

The transition from paper to electronic communication forms will decrease the amount of time and resources spent handling inmate communications and further support the Department's sustainability goal of a 50% paper reduction as an agency (by 2020).

OREGON TAYLOR'S CHECKERSPOT BUTTERFLY FUNDRAISER

Early Head Start offers a bi-weekly opportunity for incarcerated mothers and their children to strengthen their relationship and to preserve the bond of attachment while separated. Mothers gain hands-on parenting experience while their children learn through play and exploration.

Early Head Start is a national program established in 1995 to promote healthy prenatal outcomes, enhance the development of infants and toddlers, and promote healthy family functioning. The mission of the Early Head Start program at Coffee Creek is to promote, strengthen and support bonding and attachment between infants and toddlers and their incarcerated mothers.

Requirements:

- Child aged zero to three
- Minimum or minimum eligible with gate clearance
- Child lives less than 60 minutes away
- Transportation to and from the school (not provided by EHS) Tues/Thurs 9-12:30

BIRTH CERTIFICATES AND SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS

From DOC

Many already know how important it is to have your birth certificate and social security card, but it's worth repeating and even "kyting" about. Aside from the benefits of having your birth certificate while you're still inside, both pieces of identification are essential to your success after release because they are needed to get a job, open a bank account or cash a check, and apply for state or military benefits.

As you approach your release, if the DOC does not have a birth certificate or social security card on file for you and if you may be eligible to receive one provided by the DOC, you will receive a kyte from the institution records office. Those approaching age 65 will also be sent a kyte if the DIC does not have a birth certificate on record. The kyte will tell you which piece of identification is missing and give you the means to start the application process. Just fill in the information and forward the kyte to your institution records office. It's as simple as that!

NOTE: To eliminate duplications that could delay your application process, please complete and return only one each of the birth certificate and social security card kyte forms.

Please help support the Coffee Creek Taylor's Checkerspot Butterfly Program by purchasing Pizza Hut during our first fundraiser event in January 2018. This fundraiser will be open to incentive levels 2 and 3 only. The food will be in-cell and must be completely consumed in 24 hours. If you are found with food after 24 hours you will be held accountable. You will be able to purchase up to 3 pizzas (\$13 each) and 1 cinnamon bread (\$6). The order process will be done through the Kiosk. You must be a level 2 or 3 to participate. No Cell-ins, LOPS or disciplinary housing can participate. If for any reason you are unable to participate you will not be refunded and your money will be considered a donation. If you wish to donate to the butterfly program and not purchase pizza you can do so. Orders must be submitted by 1/5/2018 and pizza will be delivered 1/23/18 for medium and 1/24/18 for minimum.

For those of you who may not be familiar with the CCCF Butterfly Lab Program, it was founded this spring. The DOC Sustainability Office and CCCF partnered with US Fish and Wildlife Services and the Oregon Zoo to rear an endangered butterfly from the Willamette Valley called the Taylor's Checkerspot butterfly. The lab tech crew is proud to be the only other lab in Oregon, besides the Oregon Zoo, to be dedicated to rearing this endangered animal species. The Oregon Taylor's Checkerspot is in peril due to urban and agricultural development over the years. This species is only found in three areas of North America: Denman Island in Canada, Fort Lewis/Pudget Sound area of Washington State and in the grasslands of Corvallis, Oregon. This butterfly was listed as endangered in 2013 under the US endangered Species Act, but carries no protection in the state of Oregon.

The lab is located in H Unit and currently has 5 inmate lab technicians, who are being trained by Ronda Naseth. She is a butterfly keeper from the Oregon Zoo. Right now, the larvae are in hibernation, which is called diapause. These animals are in a diapause shed that is located on G/H yard. The survival rate of these larvae is currently at 93%. The lab tech's and Zoo officials are proud of this success rate, they were only anticipating 50% survival rate.

Once the diapause state is over and the larvae wake up, the lab tech crew will bring caterpillars back into the lab and start feeding them with Plantago leaves. The caterpillars will be cared for until they reach their chrysalis stage. US Fish and Wildlife Services will collect the larvae at that time and take them to their protected habitat before they pupate

and hatch into beautiful butterflies. Once they lay eggs, the process starts all over again

ADL WORKERS NEEDED

Are you looking for a new job? Are you a kind, caring, compassionate person? Are you looking for a way to help others and give back? Are you respectful and responsible? CCCF is currently accepting applications for ADL Worker positions. Activities of daily living (ADL's) are day to day activities like walking or pushing a wheelchair, bathing, dressing, feeding, and toileting that some inmates may not be able to do on their own; they require assistance.

In order to be considered for this position you must be housed in the Medium facility, have 6 months clear conduct and no program failures in the last 6 months. You must also have at least one year remaining of your sentence, and be physically able to lift with no medical restrictions. We are looking for individuals who communicate well with others, are patient, and respect the need for confidentiality. If you are interested in an ADL Worker position, pick up and complete an Inmate Work Application on your unit. Address your completed application to Health Services Nurse Manager and submit by placing in the Health Services kyte box on your unit. Applications received will be screened by Inmate Work Programs (IWP). Applicants who meet the minimum qualifications may be scheduled and called out for an interview. Thanks for your interest.

FAMILY CONSTELLATION WORK

Come and Experience Family Constellation Work with Sarah Peyton and a Group of Volunteers

For over 10 years, Sarah Peyton has been coming into Coffee Creek as a volunteer to teach about Nonviolent Communication and the Brain. On Monday, January 22, from 8am to 11am, she will come in with a small group of volunteers to do a special kind of work that she has been studying, that allows people to understand their lives in new, healing and self-compassionate ways. This work is called Family Constellation Work.

People who come to this workshop day will:

- Understand more about what blocks self-compassion
- Learn how trauma changes the brain
- Experience significant personal growth in the way they see themselves and others
- Get to contribute to others' well-being

- Be able to explore puzzling and confusing aspects of their lives

Ask others who have come about whether this work will help you. If you've come before, come again to learn more, make more progress and to help others. This workshop has limited space so sign up asap. Must be level 2 or 3 to participate, intakes may not sign up.

VERY IMPORTANT LIBRARY NOTES

From Ms. Wheeler, Library Coordinator

1. Library workers do not work 24 hours a day. They have been given a direct order to not discuss legal work on the units. If you have an urgent issue, please ask your unit officer to call the library.
2. DO NOT leave books on top of the book return boxes. You may earn a permanent ban from the library if this practice is continued.
3. Leave ONLY library books in the book return boxes. You may earn consequences from Education or the Chapel.
4. We have many people who have overdue library books and excess library books (more than 5 items). Effective December 1, 2017, you will not be allowed to check out books if you have overdue or excess items. We need to have the book(s) in our hands before you will be allowed this privilege again. This means we will not accept "I put it in the book return box" as a way to be allowed to check out a book.
5. We are making a change to the leisure library schedule. Effective November 27, 2017, we will call G/H on Tuesday morning, C/D Tuesday afternoon and J/K on Thursday morning. I realize this will create some work conflicts, and I am on top of worker line requests. I appreciate your patience as we try this new schedule.

Law Library notes:

1. You MUST put your schedule on your kyte when you are requesting a law library appointment. If you do not, your kyte will be returned unanswered.
2. Effective December 1, 2017, we will no longer provide loaners, unless you are in special housing. You may request an appointment to come review information on the inmate network and take notes, or you may print items and pay for them at \$0.10 per page. You MUST have money in your trust account for this print.
3. If the library is closed, your appointment will be rescheduled. There is no need to send another kyte.

Their struggles among themselves (and their entanglements with a visiting regimental army) propel each of the sisters between hope for a better future and despair for their current situation.

LEGAL CLERK WANTED

The library is currently taking applications for a legal clerk position. The **required** qualifications are as follows:

- High school diploma or GED
- Computer skills, preferably Microsoft Word
- Ability to communicate verbally and in written form
- Exceptional attention to detail
- Acceptable institution record of demeanor. This means clear conduct (no major OR minor infractions) for at least 6 months, and that you have been serving time at Coffee Creek for at least 6 months this incarceration.
- Typing skills at 40 words per minute
- Minimum of 1 year left on your sentence
- Ability to work under pressure and take direction.

- Ability to maintain good working relationships with the library coordinator, other inmate workers and library users
