Below is a list of status changes for the DOC administrative rules since 11/15/17:

PROPOSED RULES:

291-124: Health Services for Inmates in DOC Facilities

- Updates the department's rules to ensure that policies and procedures provide for adequate medical, healthcare, dental, and related services for incarcerated persons at DOC facilities.

291-053: Emergency Preparedness

- Repeals the outdated emergency preparedness rules which are no longer necessary or required.

The last day to submit comments on these proposed rules is: April 02, 2018.

HOW TO COMMENT: Written comments can be submitted to the Rules Coordinator, DOC, 2575 Center Street NE, Salem, OR 97301-4667.

TEMPORARY RULES:

291-105: Prohibited Inmate Conduct and Processing Disciplinary Actions

- Amends 291-105-0066 to align with OAR 291-011-0030(3) and allows for the functional unit manager to release an inmate from segregation when it is determined to be appropriate. Amends 291-105-0081 to update the process for adjustment to final orders.
- Effective: 01/24/18

PERMANENT RULES:

291-058: Structured, Intermediate Sanctions for Offenders

Commissary Reminders:

- Soda tickets will only be credited if an inmate has been transferred to a different facility. The inmate has 30 days from the date of transfer to submit an inmate communication form requesting a credit from the commissary where the soda tickets were purchased. You must include the unused soda tickets and a receipt as proof of purchase. The receipt may not be more than 90 days old from the date of request. Commissary will not issue credit for damaged tickets or issue credit if the soda machine takes your ticket without dispensing a soda.
- Please write legibly and include your full name, SID number and institution when submitting a commissary order form, communication or suggestion form to Commissary.
- Make sure the shoes or boots fit before you accept them. There is no DOC canteen warranty and all sales are final.
ACCESS VENDOR WARRANTY: We offer a 30 day limited warranty on all shoes. If the shoes have a manufacturer's defect, do not have worn soles, do not show signs of abuse and were purchased within the 30-day period, send the shoes, sales receipt, package authorization slip and a brief explanation for the return to:

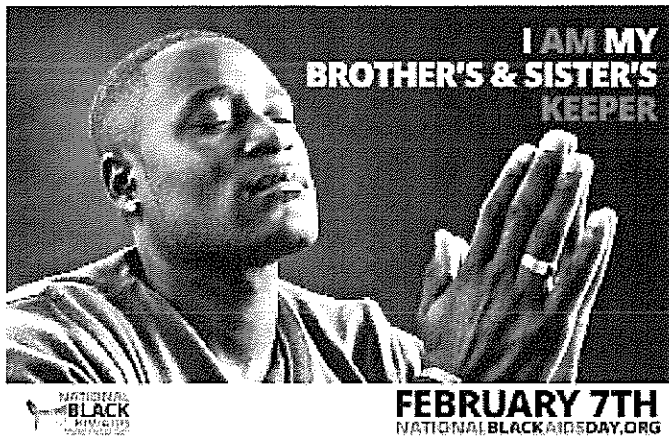

3. Start treatment. Following your treatment plan can help lower the amount of virus in your body and ultimately help you live longer.

Bankruptcy Class

CCCF will offer a class on Wednesday, April 4, covering personal financial management and bankruptcy. The class will be taught by Judge Trish Brown, of the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Portland, and her law clerk Stephen Raher. The presentation will begin with a discussion of how to responsibly use credit cards and loans, and how to avoid common financial traps. The class will then cover legal issues such as how to respond to debt collectors, the bankruptcy process, and whether it makes sense to file bankruptcy. Judge Brown cannot answer questions about individual cases, but will address common issues facing incarcerated people.

This class will be in Minimum from 8-10:30am and in Medium 1-3:30pm. Send a kyte to Ms. Wheeler in the law library to be put on the callout. Space is limited and those closest to release will be given preference. **Your kyte must be received by March 19.**

DIVORCE CLASS

Due to our Washington County Family Court contact taking a new job, we are unable to continue offering the divorce class at this time. I am not certain this program will continue, and will not have an answer for you until at least the end of May. If you were on the last callout on January 12, you were given all you need to complete your divorce.

If you wish to file for divorce before we are able to reinstate the divorce classes, you will need to contact Washington County for the divorce packet, and you will need to be prepared to purchase that packet. You should be prepared to pay the filing fee, in case your fee waiver/deferral is denied. The law library WILL NOT be able to assist you with the paperwork, and it will be up to you to remember dates and deadlines.

I do hope that in the future, we will be able to offer this service again.

must be received no later than Feb. 26th. You may order only one bowl but up to 2 sides of chicken or cookies. You must be incentive level 2 or 3. If your incentive level changes, or you are on a cell in, LOP, or you are unable to attend due to being in segregation, you will not receive a refund for your order, it will be considered a donation. You may take it to your order to your housing unit. This even will occur on March 8 in Medium and March 9 in Minimum. You must consume all food within 24 hours.

BIRTH CERTIFICATE AND SOCIAL SECURITY CARD KYTES DEJA VU

If you declined applying for either a replacement birth certificate or social security card between April 2017 and November 15, 2017, you will probably start receiving the automated kytes again. This is because we were part of the pilot program, and in implementing it statewide, an overlap in the pilot and statewide institutions' cut-off dates caused the previously declined automated kytes to restart.

If you receive another kyte and have already declined, you have the following options:

- Do nothing and continue to receive the kytes each month.
- Complete the kyte and submit it to Records to apply for the replacement ID, which will stop the kytes.
- Check the box to decline to apply for the replacement ID (again) and send it to Records, which will stop the kytes.

EYE GLASS PROGRAM RECRUITMENT

Eyeglass will be accepting applications for the optical program beginning Thursday February 16th. This is a 14-month work based education program that awards 6 PRAS points per day, progressing to 14 points by program end. The first half of each day will be spent studying curriculum about Opticianry and the other portion of the day will be spent recycling eyeglasses for the Lions Clubs International sight missions. There are several requirements that you must meet for acceptance into the program.

REQUIREMENTS:

- Willing and able to pay \$100.00 towards your Certified Paraoptometric (CPO) Examination by **May 2019**

- Commitment to work Monday-Friday 8:00am - 3:15pm as well as the occasional evening and weekend
- High School Diploma or GED
- CASAS test math score of 236 and reading score of 242
- Minimum 6 months at Coffee Creek Correctional Facility prior to applying
- Housed in minimum facility general population
- Release date after **June 2019** to allow time to complete the program
- Self-motivation to work hard, study in class and independently on your unit, and pass frequent quizzes

Upon completion of the program, subject to passing the CPO examination, you will receive certification from the American Board of Opticianry as a Certified Paraoptometric. If you are interested in pursuing a career in the optical profession please submit a DOC job application, and a KYTE explaining why you would like to be considered for the optical program, **by March 2nd, 2018**. Please place your completed KYTE and application in the Education KYTE box.

ATTENTION MOTHERS!

Do you have a child birth-5 and want 7 hours a week parenting your child?

Head Start offers a bi-weekly opportunity for incarcerated mothers and their children to strengthen their relationship and to preserve the bond of attachment while separated. Mothers gain hands-on parenting experience while their children learn through play and exploration.

Head Start is a national program established in 1965 to promote healthy prenatal outcomes, enhance the development of young children and promote healthy family functioning. The mission of the Head Start program at Coffee Creek is to promote, strengthen, and support bonding and attachment between children and their incarcerated mothers.

Requirements:

- Child aged birth-5
- Minimum or minimum eligible with gate clearance
- Child lives less than 60 minutes away
- Transportation to and from the school every Tues/Thurs 9:00-12:30

BIRTH CERTIFICATES AND SOCIAL SECURITY CARDS

From DOC

Many already know how important it is to have your birth certificate and social security card, but it's worth repeating and even "kyting" about. Aside from the benefits of having your birth certificate while you're still inside, both pieces of identification are essential to your success after release because they are needed to get a job, open a bank account or cast a check, and apply for state or military benefits.

As you approach your release, if the DOC does not have a birth certificate or social security card on file for you and if you may be eligible to receive one provided by the DOC, you will receive a kyte from the institution records office. Those approaching age 65 will also be sent a kyte if the DIC does not have a birth certificate on record. The kyte will tell you which piece of identification is missing and give you the means to start the application process. Just fill in the information and forward the kyte to your institution records office. It's as simple as that!

NOTE: To eliminate duplications that could delay your application process, please complete and return only one each of the birth certificate and social security card kyte forms.

SUSTAINABILITY NEWS

From Green Team

Happy Valentine's Day to the incoming Taylor's Checkerspot Butterflies! CCCF Lab workers have been closely observing hundreds of Butterfly eggs in the specially-made storage unit on G/H Yard and they're just about ready to be woken up! The eggs entered diapause this cold season right outside their Lab window where they kept weekly tabs on the temperature of the sleeping area and adjusted humidity controls appropriately. Beginning with 897 eggs, 180 of them have already stirred within the groups of 15. Referred to as "scouts," the early risers check out micro-climatic changes and wiggle around their sleeping mates before returning to a peaceful slumber.

The groups of eggs cuddle in the little tissue-like sleeping bags and will awaken hungry for fresh Plantago leaves provided by the women. Their soul plant of choice, Plantagos, are grown in the lab, in Minimum's Hoop House and soon to G/H yard. Daily harvested, organic leaves provide essential nutrients for healthy growth into pupae before adult Butterfly. The Lab women participate in an essential part of biodiversity benefiting protected sites in & around Corvallis, OR.

Watch your Unit Post-boards for updates when they place new pictures! Also, the Lab is collecting clean Peanut-Butter jars for their TACE Event display. To help out, thoroughly clean donated PB jars and take off the labels if able. Collect on your Units and the Recycling Orderly will deliver them to Ms. Fitts. Homemade Butterfly Feeders will be made with the jars by participants at this Summer's TACE Event.

The Wilsonville Food Bank was not the only recipient of donations from our work in reducing, reusing and recycling. Oregonians were able to receive eyeglasses, hearing aids and preventative screenings thanks to valuable donations built from our recyclables! Our CCCF Physical Plant and specifically the CDC Pallet Furniture & Wood Shop have upcycled waste into attractive, sturdy furniture. Donations brought funding for the Willamette Humane Society and recently to OLSHF, raising \$1600 for sight and hearing surgeries preventing blindness and deafness.

Activities of daily living (ADL's) are day to day activities like walking or pushing a wheelchair, bathing, dressing, feeding, and toileting that some inmates may not be able to do on their own; they require assistance.

In order to be considered for this position you must be housed in the Medium facility, have 6 months clear conduct and no program failures in the last 6 months. You must also

have at least one year remaining of your sentence, and be physically able to lift with no medical restrictions. We are looking for individuals who communicate well with others, are patient, and respect the need for confidentiality. If you are interested in an ADL Worker position, pick up and complete an Inmate Work Application on your unit. Address your completed application to Health Services Nurse Manager and submit by placing in the Health Services kyte box on your unit. Applications received will be screened by Inmate Work Programs (IWP). Applicants who meet the minimum qualifications may be scheduled and called out for an interview. Thanks for your interest.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Informational Session for the next Victim/Offender Education Group (VOEG) will be held on Thursday March 1st at 7pm. Using the principles of Restorative Justice, this intensive 26 week training is offered for those who wish to better understand themselves and how their crimes have impacted their victim(s), their families and their community.

There are three specific areas of focus in the course:
1. Offender Education and Accountability, 2. Victim Impact and Sensitivity 3. Victim/Offender Dialogue with a Surrogate Panel. The purpose of this intensive training is to help offenders fully understand and take responsibility for the impact of their actions and to make the necessary changes in their lives in order to live a productive life free from prison. Restorative Justice research shows that given the opportunity to understand their choices in life and the impact those choices have had on others, offenders can play an important role in helping restore to whole the lives of their victims, their community and themselves.

The weekly 2 hour course will be offered on Thursday evenings. Class size is limited to between 8-10 participants. You must attend the information session **EVEN IF YOU ARE ON THE WAIT LIST!** Sign up in your unit if you are interested in finding out more about VOEG.
