## **NO PACKAGE AUTHORIZATION FORM. NO PACKAGE.**

*(You DO NOT need one for your books, calendar or magazine orders.)*

- I. To get your dress outs, glasses, soft glass case, legal paperwork from an attorney over 3 inches thick, your medical device, etc. you have to have an approved Package Authorization form with the box.
  - a. It can take up to a month to get the authorized form back from staff, mailed out to your sender and the package mailed in to CRCI.
  - b. Plan your timeline with this in mind, mail-ins (without the form attached) will rarely be approved. It must be a verified emergency, not because you “forgot to fill out a form.”
  
- II. **DO NOT ASK FOR THE ITEM SENT IN UNTIL IT IS APPROVED & YOU GET THE SIGNED FORM BACK. ONLY THEN MAIL IT TO YOURSENDER WITH YOUR ORDER.**
  
- III. If the Package Authorization form’s label is not on the incoming box with the inventory list inside, it will be returned to the sender.
  
- IV. The form (CD948) is on your units. If out ask your Unit Officer for one and he/she can request them from administration

for the unit.

**AUTHORIZING STAFF**

For dress outs, and other items not in medical or legal categories send the form to the Operations Lt. Office

Medical devices, glasses, etc. send to S. Green, Medical Mail Box

Legal Work/Discs from courts or your attorney send to L. Hust, Book Drop

Religious Items send to the Chaplain’s Office, Programs Mail Box

## ● CANTEEN PROCESSES

### ● From M. Livesay, Canteen Coordinator

● The order in which canteen is picked up is the same as the chow line for the week. Units 1-6 are on Tuesday, and 7 & 8 are on Wednesday.

● **Please do not come to the window until you hear your unit called.**

● If you do, you will be told to leave immediately and if the problem persists, I will close the window until only the unit called is present. If a unit comes down in anticipation of being the next unit called, your entire unit will be sent back to your dorm and you will collect your canteen AFTER programs on Wednesday. **It is up to all on the unit to hold each other accountable for remembering this rule and communicating it to anyone that doesn't know or remember.**

● **Please be respectful when waiting for your order. That means not blocking the law library door at any time. Give your ID to the orderly at the window and take a seat. You will be called when your order is ready.**

● **If your unit was called earlier and you have not received your canteen, you may come to the window at any time to collect your items.**

● **If you ordered canteen from another unit, you must wait for that unit to be called to collect your items.**

● **If you are a worker, or are in a class of some kind, I need to expressly hear from your manager or facilitator that you would like to get your canteen at a time other than when your unit is called. We will do our best to work with these requests, though due to volume on some weeks, it may not always be possible.**

● With the holidays approaching, we need to work together to ensure that there is as much order as possible to the process. To do that, we need your full cooperation. I am hoping that if everyone has the above information, the process can be expedited as much as possible.

### Policy changes regarding Senate Bill 844 (ORS 423.105/105) TRANSITIONAL SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

Based upon a new policy direction, the department has made changes to the way we will implement Senate Bill 844 (ORS 423.105/105). As you may remember from previous emails, the Department of Corrections (DOC) is authorized to collect a portion of eligible trust account deposits for two important reasons:

- Transitional savings accounts and
- Court-ordered financial obligations

Below are key components to the recent changes:

#### Protected Spending Accounts

- Deposits into transitional savings accounts, that took place as a result of protected funds transfers into general spending accounts, have been reversed. Adults in custody (AIC) will see this reversal on their next Trust statement.
- AICs will be able to transfer funds from their protected reserve accounts into general spending without ORS 423.105 being

applied.

- The new policy decision establishes that protected funds are exempt from Court-Ordered Financial Obligations (COFO) when transferred to a general spending account to purchase commissary. In other words, the transfer of funds from protected reserve accounts into general spending will no longer be an "eligible deposit" and therefore no collection of ORS 423.105 will occur.
- A letter was sent to each AIC who has received some form of protected funds since July 2018.

### Next Steps for Protected Accounts

- We are making system changes to allow *commissary spending* to occur from either a protected reserve account or a general spending account, but this will take time. Until the system is **(CONTINUED ON THE NEXT PAGE)** reprogrammed, AICs will need to transfer funds from their protected reserve accounts into their general spending accounts if they wish to make commissary purchases.
- In the interim, while we are reprogramming our accounting system, internal (DOC) debt and external debt (Court Fees, etc.) collection has been suspended for AICs who receive protected funds. The suspension of all debt collection will remain in place until a better solution has been found.

### Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA Information)

The Oregon Department of Corrections (ODOC) has a zero tolerance policy for sexual abuse, sexual harassment and for retaliation for reporting an incident. You may report in person to any staff, through an inmate communication, through the grievance system, by calling the PREA hotline by dialing 9 from any inmate phone.

#### **Filing an Anonymous PREA Report**

If you are uneasy about filing a PREA allegation, you may file an anonymous report with an outside agency.

Please indicate in the beginning of your letter you are filing a PREA allegation and you are requesting to remain anonymous. The Governor's Office will refer all anonymous allegations to the DOC PREA Coordinator to assure an investigation is completed based off the information that is provided.

#### **Community-Based PREA Advocacy (Support) Program**

ODOC has partnered with community based, confidential advocates of sexual abuse victims to provide services to inmates.

Inmates at ODOC who have experienced sexual abuse may reach a community-based advocate by dialing 711 inmate telephone systems, or may request a private call through the PREA Compliance Manager at the facility. Advocates provide victims of sexual abuse information about their options, resources, information and emotional support. There is no charge for calls to advocates.

#### Role of an Advocate:

- Provide confidential support and crisis intervention
- Inform you about the investigation and medical examination process
- Educate you about healing from sexual abuse
- Offer resources and referrals

#### Advocates will:

- Not tell you what to do
- Not communicate with the institution unless you request them to do so and sign a release
- Not provide legal advice

Community-based advocacy centers provide sexual abuse support to people of all genders. Community-based advocates will not report unless you request them to do so and if you sign a release of information.

DOC is committed to providing inmates with avenues to seek assistance. Below are additional resources:

The community-based advocacy crisis line is for individuals needing assistance coping with sexual abuse related issues and should not be used for other purposes.

Telephone calls and mail with community-based advocacy centers is considered privileged communication and will be handled similar to legal calls/official mail.

## Institution Channel Offerings & Changes FAQ September 20, 2018

Due to rising TV costs, it has become necessary to make changes to the programming offered to the men and women in our custody. These changes will allow the Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) to lower the overall cost of providing this service. As you know, DOC has a set budget and we must manage this service within that amount. Given the complexity of this process in the past, we determined that there should be some local control over selection and authority to

change channel assignments.

**Effective September 2018, the local management for each institution has been charged with:**

- (1) deciding what satellite TV channels can be programmed for their site, and**
- (2) defining whatever process they wish to manage and deny or accept requests for changes to those channel offerings.**

Communication (kytes) requesting changes to satellite TV channel assignments should no longer be sent to DOC headquarters. Rather, these requests should go up the local chain of command. It is our hope that driving the ability to select and change channels at the local level (where staff are more directly engaged with adults in custody (AICs) on a daily basis) will allow for more rapid decision-making.

As institution staff consider channel selections, there are recommended selection guides offered to consider. Should there be questions about authorized channel selections, the contractor is a great resource to ask for insight prior to making choices. Lastly, local staff are strongly encouraged to periodically monitor the channels to assure that inadvertent changes have not occurred and their desired line-up of programming is maintained.

**Q: How is the cost of providing satellite TV determined?**

As a contracted service, Satellite TV is broken into base and add-on packages—just like it is for your friends and families on the outside. The cost of Satellite TV changes depending on the package being offered, and the number of TVs connected and receiving programming.

**Q: Why can't there be more TV channels and diverse choices at my institution?**

Because Oregon DOC has a set budget, we cannot spend more than what has been authorized. DOC simply does not have the budget to

purchase each and every channel combination package available (and our installed systems do not have the bandwidth).

**Q: What caused the change in channel selection and availability?**

Due to rising TV package subscription costs, it became necessary to make a change to programming packages. Eliminating these packages lowered the overall cost of satellite TV at our institutions.

**Q: Is there anything else that restricts programming aside from cost?**

Not every channel's programming is actually appropriate or suitable for viewing within the corrections environment. This means that channel and programming choices must be made that will simply not please all people at all times.

### Q: What about Spanish language channels?

DOC has worked with our contractor to provide acceptable programming choices and is happy to report the following channels will be adding into our line-up starting October 1:

- Azteca America
- Discovery En Espanol
- History En Espanol
- Telemundo
- NBC Universo

### Q: What will the process be for making or requesting changes to the channel offerings?

Effective September 2018, senior management for each institution has been charged with deciding what channels can be programed for their site. Each institution will also define their process for handling and accepting requests for changes to those programming channel choices.

Inmate kytes to request new channels or changes to the TV channel assignments should no longer be sent to Oregon DOC Headquarters. Instead, kytes need to go up the local chain of command to the institution's management.

### Q: How will my institution decide what programming is appropriate?

Institution staff have been provided with recommended selection guides, and will use these materials and their knowledge of what channels are popular or helpful at their institution.

### Q: How will this change of process impact me?

It is our hope that giving your institution the ability to select and change channels, changes can be approved and made more rapidly than under the old process.

### Q: How does the change in process impact me if/when I move institutions?

As inmates move from institution to institution, the channels available may vary somewhat. Each institution's process used to accept channel change requests may be different as well.
