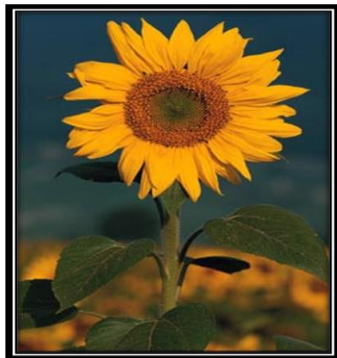

DOC administrative rules since 03/22/19.**

PROPOSED RULES:

291-058 Structured, Intermediate Sanctions

- Amends rules to implement changes made in 2017 legislation related to the supervision of drug-related misdemeanors. Rule changes will now include application to drug related misdemeanors as defined in ORS 423.478 for crimes committed on or after August 15, 2017.
- Last day to provide comment: 06/14/19

291-077 Performance Recognition and Award System (PRAS)

- Proposed amendments to rules to remove the 120 day waiting period.
- Last day to provide comment: 06/14/19

Caseload Reset

Correctional Counselors' caseloads have been rearranged in order to better serve those most in need. These changes are necessary if the Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) is to provide quality case management services to the adults in custody (AIC) most likely to reoffend as determined by their Automated Criminal Risk Score (ACRS).

ACRS is a statistical calculation developed by the DOC Research Unit to predict your risk of reoffending within three years of release. Your score is automatically calculated at Coffee Creek Intake Center (CCIC) and is based upon the following: age, earned time, revocations, sentence length, custody number, thefts committed, prior incarcerations, and person to person crimes. The score is recalculated whenever any of these items change. Another way to understand ACRS is to look at it from a percentage standpoint. The scores range from .01 to .99. If your ACRS is .15, then you have an estimated 15% chance of reoffending within three years of your release.

If DOC had the resources it needed, Institution Counselors would provide cognitive interventions through case management to all AICs who need it. Because DOC does not have the capacity to provide case management services to everyone, Counselors' caseloads have been adjusted to provide cognitive interventions to AICs most likely to reoffend.

To make caseload sizes more manageable, DOC had to significantly adjust the ACRS cutoff score. Due to resource discrepancy across the institutions, the cutoff scores won't be consistent and are as follows:

SRCI, OSP, TRCI, EOCI

.01 - .24 ACRS = Low Supervision

.25 - ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

OSCI

.01 - .34 = Low Supervision

.35 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

CRCI, DRCI, PRCF, SCCI, SCI, SRCI Minimum, TRCI Minimum

.01 - .34 = Low Supervision

.35 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

WCCF

.01 - .39 = Low Supervision

.40 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

MCCE, SFFC

.01 - .49 = Low Supervision

.50 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

CCCF, CCCM

.01 - .19 = Low Supervision

.20 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

Low Supervision:

If you are placed on a Low Supervision caseload (as determined by your institution), you will not meet with your Institution Counselor on a regular basis and will only be seen for emergencies or unusual circumstances. Any reporting will be through written communication. If you need an in-person meeting, you will need to provide specific details in your request.

Although you will not have regular contact with your Institution Counselor, your eligibility to attend programming offered by Pathfinders (group cognitive classes and parenting classes) and participate in our alcohol and drug treatment programs will not be impacted. Eligibility and placement into these programs remain the same.

High/Medium Supervision

If you are placed on a High/Medium Supervision caseload (as determined by your institution), you will meet with your Institution Counselor on a regular basis, working on your customized Behavior Change Plan and receive cognitive interventions from your counselor.

Each time you are transferred from one institution to another, you will receive an Intake Information Sheet and Contact/Resource List that provides information specific to that facility. You will also have the opportunity to ask questions at your institution's Admission and Orientation program for new arrivals to help you manage your affairs during your incarceration.

These changes will be implemented June 1, 2019, for male institutions and July 1, 2019, for women at CCCF.

HIV-Hepatitis Counseling, Testing and Referral

HIV/HEP CTR is an evidence-based program through the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) offered by ODOC.



Process: Individuals will be pre-tested through a confidential process with an harm reduction HIV/Hepatitis content expert. Blood draw will occur within two weeks and results will be delivered to patient in clinic by contractor within a week of receipt to ODOC.

Some of the topics and processes covered in workshop are:

- ✓ Potential risk behaviors
- ✓ Current perceived risk
- ✓ What to do while waiting for results
- ✓ Preventing future risks
- ✓ Staying healthy
- ✓ Next Steps

Self-Management Skills for Living Well (Formerly CDSMP) *Living Well* is an evidence-based program through Stanford University offered by ODOC.

Goal: Support increased health literacy and healthier decision-making by adults in custody.

Workshops: Living Well workshops are 2.5 hours, once a week for 7 weeks.

Some of the topics and processes covered in workshop are:

- Problem solving
- Setting goals and making action plans to reach goals
- Healthier eating and being more physically active
- Dealing with difficult emotions
- Communicating more effectively
- Relaxation techniques
- Managing symptoms
- Using medication properly
- Making decisions
- And much, much more....

Hepatitis-HIV- AIDS-Awareness Program (HHAAP)

Mission: to work in partnership with correctional staff and incarcerated persons to address HIV, Hepatitis and health disparity education available to everyone inside the Oregon State Correctional System.

History: Began by inmates for inmates at OSP in mid-1990's to help educate on HIV/AIDS transmission and prevention.

Classes: HHAAP classes are divided into 4 modules:

1. **Peer education:** Goals and concepts for becoming an effective peer educator.
2. **HIV 101:** Introduction to HIV and AIDS, risk factors, prevention methods and treatments.
3. **Hepatitis A, B and C:** Introduction to viral Hepatitis, risk factors, prevention methods and treatments.
4. **STD 101:** Overview of most common STD's, risk factors, prevention methods and treatments.

TUTOR TRAINING ANNOUNCEMENT

This years LIFT Tutor training will be held in September 2019.

Do you have a High School diploma or GED, high scores in math and reading? Do you have at least 6 months clear conduct and 2+ years left on your sentence? Do you have the willingness and aptitude to help others learn? Would you like to have a work assignment that starts at 14 points?

The Education Department is asking for applicants who wish to become a tutor (see Qualifications.) **Applications are being accepted beginning 6/1/19 through 7/31/19.** Interviews with instructor panel will be in August 2019.

Those with reading or math scores that are too low, but you feel you can bring them up, can still apply if you feel you can retest to the required levels. I will schedule you for the testing.

Fill out an **Inmate Work Application** completely as possible and send to Ms. Beecroft in the Education Department if you wish to be considered for the interview and training.

QUALIFICATIONS

1. No major misconduct sanctions in last 6 months
2. No program fails in last 6 months
3. No IMU housing in last 6 months
4. Have a minimum 2 years left on sentence
5. Must not be restricted to a housing unit
6. Must be willing to work on any unit or classroom
7. Legible handwriting
8. To become Tutor Certified requires a GED or High School Diploma, and CASAS reading score of 242+ and math 236+ & Be chosen from interview with an instructor panel

Corban University New Four Year College Degree Program

Oregon Department of Corrections, Corban University and Paid In Full Oregon have partnered to bring a four year Bachelor of Science degree program to the Oregon State Correctional Institution. Corban University is a private Christian university in Salem, Oregon, accredited by the Northwest Commission of Colleges and Universities. Paid In Full Oregon is a non-profit organization founded with the purpose of partnering with DOC and Corban University “to provide inmates a fully accredited bachelor’s degree; transforming inmates into spiritual leaders and impacting the prison population throughout the State of Oregon.” Paid In Full Oregon is raising all the funds for this program. There will be no cost to students. The graduates will earn a Bachelor of Science in Liberal Arts with an emphasis in Psychology, Social Service, and Leadership. This program is about transforming lives – by transforming adults in custody into spiritual leaders and then sending those leaders throughout DOC to transform the lives of others. Graduates will not remain at OSCI, rather they will be sent to other institutions to serve as mentors to others.

Twenty five students will be enrolled each year, for a maximum capacity of 100 students. Adults in custody will be transferred to OSCI from other institutions if accepted into the program. We forecast the first term to start September, 2019. This is a voluntary program. The minimum requirements are:

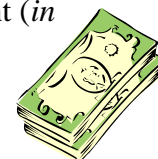
- Minimum of eight years left on sentence at time of enrollment.
- Non-Cash Incentive Level of 3. Level 2s may be considered with institution review and approval, on a case by case basis.
- High school diploma or equivalent.
- Minimum CASAS scores: Math – 236, Reading – 242.
- Successful application which will include recommendation forms and three short essays. These are included in the application packet.
- Agreement to mentor others upon completion of degree.
- Sincerely desire the program for reasons stated in the mission. Religious Services Chaplains will determine the sincerity level.



We are now accepting applications. If you meet the basic criteria listed above and wish to enroll in this program, send an Inmate Communication form to Mr. Jeremy Yraguen, Administrator, DOC Education, 3405 Deer Park Dr. SE, Salem, OR, 97310. The Education staff will ensure you meet the basic criteria and then send you an enrollment application with directions on how to proceed. **Completed applications must be returned to Mr. Yraguen no later than July 1, 2019.**

Updated Trust Transfer Request Form (CD1832)

- Effective immediately, AIC Financial Services has updated their form that allows for AICs to transfer funds between their trust accounts.
- The updated form allows for AICs to transfer funds into their Transitional Savings Trust Account (*in addition to the 5% that goes into Transitional Savings from eligible deposits*).
 - In accordance with ORS 423.105, the amount in an AIC’s Transitional Savings Trust Account may not exceed \$500.00.
- This new form will be available electronically by submitting the request using Telmate Tablet or Station (Kiosk).
- The updated form also provides additional options for transferring funds into Trust subaccounts with appropriate approvals.



AICs may address questions pertaining to the trust account transfer process to AIC Financial Services (*electronic communication preferred*).
