The Recreation Building will be closed all day/evening on Friday, July 12, 2019.

This year's Car and Bike show will be held on Saturday, July 13, 2019. For those who purchased VIP Passes, you will be put on call pass for Wednesday, July 3, 2019, from 1:00 p.m. until 3:00 p.m, to pick up your IDs. For those that purchased snacks, call passes will be issued for Monday, July 8. and Tuesday, July 9, 2019, from 1:00 p.m. until 3:00 p.m. to pickup your Snack Sale tickets.

There will be several tents on the yard during the show. With the exception of a few for specific booths, the rest of the tents are meant to provide shade to the guests and the Car Show workers that are visiting with the guests. Presidents Meeting Minutes from May 28, 2019**Topics Discussed:**

1. Prior meeting issues
 - a. Mr. Yoder is still working with the elevator technician to make the Infirmary elevator accessible for certain Activities events. This will be completed by the end of June.
 - b. The Veterans President gave Captain Bellman the number of people that would be impacted by incorporating a new senior showers time. Captain Bellman will follow up on this.
 - c. Mr. Wagner said that Mr. Kelly spoke with the D-Block sergeant about an apparent issue of cell doors not being

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opened for Thursday night Activities meetings and this should be rectified.

2. There was concern expressed regarding certain fundraiser items being approved by the PRC or Executive Team, but then the transport memo or new fundraiser form being denied, as well as some items being denied due to planned pricing not being high enough. Captain Bellman said some fundraisers were approved that shouldn't have been as the items are in competition with canteen. He says if the new fundraiser forms are utilized that issue won't take place anymore. The clubs concern was that to double the cost of all items would make things too expensive. As a result, the administration is going to put out a sliding scale rate for mark ups for fundraisers.
3. Many AIC's are feeling that there is a disconnect between the administration and line staff about normalization treatment. Uhruru SaSa, and other club presidents, are requesting a town hall style meeting with the administration and a few line staff. The meeting would be to discuss issues so AIC's are treated pro-socially according to the Oregon Accountability Model and in line with the normalization being discussed as a result of visiting Norway's prison system. The idea presented is that the meeting would be videotape the meetings and then show them to the population. Mr. Wagner pointed out that it will take time to change the culture. He thinks things are heading in the right direction and isn't sure about having such a meeting. Mr. Yoder said he would talk to Mr. Kelly about the idea of the meeting.
4. It was asked if four and five bar of D and E Blocks could get holes drilled in the door tracks and each cell receive a padlock to the cell so AIC's in those cells could get in and out of their cells like in A-Block. The idea is there is a criteria for getting into those single cells, so they are similar to honor housing and it would help those AIC's and reduce staff workloads. Mr. Yoder said he would talk to Mr. Kelly about it.
5. It was asked if there is a written rule regarding shirts being required at religious events, such as Wicca and Asatru. This came up, as apparently in the past, the guidelines were to follow the yard rule of shorts being required but not shirts, and now people are being told they must wear a shirt. Mr. Yoder said the rule would be about religious services. Mr. Wagner said the norm in the community, according to religious services, is not to be shirtless.
6. It was stated that there have been issues with access to the runner's turnout on weekends and that this issue keeps arising. It was said that each time it is brought up to line staff and the OIC, the issue gets rectified but comes back up later. Captain Bellman said to bring specific incidents to him and he will correct it. He also stated that in the mornings A3 is being cleared for breakfast before AM runners is called in order to get the OCE workers to work on time and not fill the chow hall with runners that come out of their cells when runners is called, but opt to go to breakfast instead of to the yard.
7. It was asked what the policies are for incarcerated husbands and wives to communicate via phone or video visit. Mr. Yoder will look into the matter.
8. There were questions and concerns regarding requirements to register a phone number, specifically for those without a social security number, for those with foreign currency, and that the helpline is only in English. Mr. Yoder said to write to Mr. Charles Kleiver at the Dome building.
9. Report from two clubs regarding things they are working on:
 - a. The Athletic Club
 - i. Currently waiting on Nike funding in order to finish plans for replacing the current running track.
 - ii. Looking into replacing the wood on the bleachers and benches with a more durable plastic.
 - iii. Donated \$1500 to Camp Agape, a camp for kids with an incarcerated parent.
 - iv. Recently donated some money to the TV Room to assist with equipment repairs.
 - v. Donated \$1000 to help a family in Gresham who had a family member pass away in New York and needed funds to get the body home.
 - b. The 7th Step Club
 - i. They have been working with the Asian club and the

counselors about programs and having two clubs meet every two weeks with the counselors. This is to discuss the available programs so counselors are more involved in clubs and helping guys on their caseload by getting them into positive helpful programs.

- ii. They are also working on a new parenting program to get more guys parenting skills.

Hypothyroidism

Hypothyroidism, also called underactive thyroid disease, is a common disorder. With hypothyroidism, your thyroid gland does not make enough thyroid hormone.

The thyroid gland is located in the front lower part of your neck. Hormones released by the gland travel through your bloodstream and affect nearly every part of your body, from your heart and brain, to your muscles and skin.

The thyroid controls how your body's cells use energy from food, a process called metabolism. Among other things, your metabolism affects your body's temperature, your heartbeat, and how well you burn calories. If you don't have enough thyroid hormone, your body processes slow down. That means your body makes less energy, and your metabolism becomes sluggish.

If you have hypothyroidism, your doctor will prescribe a synthetic (man-made) thyroid hormone T4. You take this pill every day. Certain other medications can interfere with how your body absorbs synthetic thyroid hormone. Make sure your doctor knows about all the medicines, herbs, and supplements you take, including over-the-counter products.

You will need regular blood tests to check your thyroid hormone levels. Your doctor may need to adjust your medication dose from time to time. If you have hypothyroidism and would like more information, please kyte Medical Services.

Caseload Reset

Correctional Counselors' caseloads have been rearranged in order to better serve those most in need. These changes are necessary if the Oregon Department of Corrections (DOC) is to provide quality case management services to the adults in custody (AIC) most likely to reoffend as determined by their Automated Criminal Risk Score (ACRS).

ACRS is a statistical calculation developed by the DOC Research Unit to predict your risk of reoffending within three years of release. Your score is automatically calculated at Coffee Creek Intake Center (CCIC) and is based upon the following: age, earned time, revocations, sentence length, custody number, thefts committed, prior incarcerations, and person to person crimes. The score is recalculated whenever any of these items change. Another way to understand ACRS is to look at it from a percentage standpoint. The scores range from .01 to .99. If your ACRS is .15, then you have an estimated 15% chance of reoffending within three years of your release.

If DOC had the resources it needed, Institution Counselors would provide cognitive interventions through case management to all AICs who need it. Because DOC does not have the capacity to provide case management services to everyone, Counselors' caseloads have been adjusted to provide cognitive interventions to AICs most likely to reoffend.

To make caseload sizes more manageable, DOC had to significantly adjust the ACRS cutoff score. Due to resource discrepancy across the institutions, the cutoff scores won't be consistent and are as follows:

SRCI, OSP, TRCI, EOCI

.01 - .24 ACRS = Low Supervision

.25 - ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

OSCI

.01 - .34 = Low Supervision

.35 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

CRCI, DRICI, PRCF, SCCI, SCI, SRCI Minimum, TRCI Minimum

.01 - .34 = Low Supervision

.35 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

WCCF

.01 - .39 = Low Supervision

.40 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

MCCF, SFFC

.01 - .49 = Low Supervision

.50 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

CCCF, CCCM

.01 - .19 = Low Supervision

.20 ACRS and higher = High/Medium Supervision

Low Supervision:

If you are placed on a Low Supervision caseload (as determined by your institution), you will not meet with your Institution Counselor on a regular basis and will only be seen for emergencies or unusual circumstances. Any reporting will be through written communication. If you need an in-person meeting, you will need to provide specific details in your request.

Although you will not have regular contact with your Institution Counselor, your eligibility to attend programming offered by Pathfinders (group cognitive classes and parenting classes) and participate in our alcohol and drug treatment programs will not be impacted. Eligibility and placement into these programs remain the same.

High/Medium Supervision

If you are placed on a High/Medium Supervision caseload (as determined by your institution), you will meet with your Institution Counselor on a regular basis, working on your customized Behavior Change Plan and receive cognitive interventions from your counselor.

Each time you are transferred from one institution to another, you will receive an Intake Information Sheet and Contact/Resource List that provides information specific to that facility. You will also have the opportunity to ask questions at your institution's Admission and Orientation program for new arrivals to help you manage your affairs during your incarceration.

These changes will be implemented June 1, 2019, for male institutions and July 1, 2019, for women at CCCF.
