Visiting Reminder for AICs

Thank you for your patience during this difficult time with outside visiting. As a reminder, with Covid shutdowns it's important that you make sure to resubmit a visiting application if they have not visited in two(2) years or they will be automatically dropped from your visiting list. If this occurs, the visitor must then submit a new application to be added to the list. We also ask that you monitor visiting points and keep your visitors apprised of your visit availability. AICs are allowed visiting points based on the Non-Cash Incentive (NCI) program. Incentive Level 1's receive 24 points, Incentive Level 2's receive 29 points and Incentive Level 3's receive 34 points. Points can be found by either sending an AIC Communication to the visiting desk Corporal or for the most current update, ask your visiting room Sgt. to check during your visit. This gives you Realtime information to pass to your visitors. Visitors will be denied entry upon a zero point balance. Points will be automatically refreshed on the first calendar day of the month. Visitors will not be allowed to ask Staff about point status. The latest Visiting Room Rule changes can be found beginning at OAR 291-127-0405.

OAR 291-127-0430

- (1) The number of visits approved in any calendar month for inmatess in a Department of Corrections facility shall be limited in accordance with the following point value system:
- (2) Each inmate who is permitted visiting (privileged or basic) shall be allocated visiting points each calendar month in accordance with their incentive level as outlined in OAR 291-077. (Typical monthly start is 34 points for level 3.)
- (3) Visiting points shall not be deducted for a child under the age of three, as long as the child is held during the visiting session. Visiting points shall not be deducted for visitors age 65 and older.
- (4) On weekdays, one point shall be deducted for each visitor per visiting session.
- (5) On weekends and holidays, two points shall be deducted for each visitor per visiting session, except in those Department of Corrections facilities with

weekend visiting only, in which case one point shall be deducted for each visitor per visiting session.

(6) However, visitation periods when points are not deducted may be permitted at the discretion of the superintendent or designee.

For Multnomah County convictions only: Effective January 1, 2022, Senate Bill 819 (SB 819) will go into effect. SB 819 established a procedure for people convicted of, and sentenced for, felony offenses to petition their sentencing court for reconsideration of their conviction(s) and/or sentences. The Multnomah County District Attorney's Office has compiled their own process and application for SB 819 consideration.

In a prior newsletter, we indicated that packets would be provided free of charge by the Law Library. The packets were going to be free because Multnomah County District Attorney's Office planned to mail the packets to Dept. of Corrections (DOC). Multnomah County has notified DOC that they will not be mailing packets in for AICs to use. DOC will now be printing the packets. You may purchase a copy of this document from the Law Library. Please fill out a Law Library Request form (CD 1714) to be scheduled for a forms appointment. You will need to fill out a legal photocopy request form and CD 28.

For Curry County convictions only:

Curry County District Attorney's Office does not have a specific form that must be filled out in order for a request to be considered. Someone requesting review of their case should provide the following:

- o The conviction(s) underlying the sentence for which the requestor seeks a conviction or sentence reconsideration.
- o Whether the conviction is on direct appeal (if it is, the case is ineligible for consideration).
- o Reasons why the original sentence no longer serves the interests of justice.

- o The requestor's desired result: No conviction at all? Conviction of a different crime? Reduction of prison sentence? Reduction of fine? Etc.
- o Information that addresses the considerations listed in ORS 137.218:
- The requestors disciplinary record in jail or prison (if applicable) and record of rehabilitation while incarcerated.
- Evidence that reflects whether the requestor's age, time served in-custody, and diminished physical or mental condition, if any, have reduced the requestor's risk for future violence.
- The future safety of the victim of the crime(s) for which the requestor seeks conviction or sentence reconsideration.
- The amount of the original sentence already served by the requestor.
- Evidence that reflects changed circumstances since the requestor's conviction and shows that the requestor's sentence no longer advances the interests of justice

For all other County convictions:

Other than Wasco, Lake, Marion. Coos, Jackson, Malheur, Grant, Klamath, Washington, Linn, Multnomah, Deschutes, Curry, Josephine and Lane County, DOC has no further information regarding SB 819. You will need to contact all other District Attorney's Offices for more information. We will update as we receive information from District Attorney's Office.

Please do not send CD-28 in the mail to the Legal Library. All CD-28's that are sent in the mail to the legal library will not be processed. AlCs will need to be scheduled on a call out for a form's appointment. AlCs will need to fill out a legal photocopy request form and CD 28.

All items that are notarized need to be mailed out of the legal library. Please bring an envelope to your scheduled appointment.

Prison Rape Elimination Act Questions and Answers

Here are the most asked questions when it comes to PREA:

- How can I report a PREA allegation?
 Answer: You can report an allegation to any staff member, the OIC, PREA grievance, PREA hotline, AIC communication and by third party.
- 2. If I use the PREA hotline or advocacy hotline are my calls confidential?
 - Answer: Yes, once you enter your pin number and press 9 for the PREA hotline or 711 to talk to a victim advocate, the phone system will not record the conversation or log that the number was called
- 3. What is the buzzer sound I hear in all housing blocks, units and infirmary? Answer: That buzzer sound is to make all AICs aware a staff member of the opposite gender has entered the area.
- 4. Is there a resource outside of the institution I can talk to about PREA confidentially? Answer: Yes, the Center for Hope and Safety is an advocacy group that is there for you 24/7?

The role of the advocate is to –
Amplify the victim's voice
Redirect victim blaming
Provide emotional support
Explain options for reporting

Help victim process decision (not guide, recommend or suggest what is right)
Provide resources and referrals
Sit through forensic exam / investigatory interview if desired by the victim.
Support family and friends of the victim

You can reach the advocate by dialing 711. The calls are confidential, not logged or recorded.

GENERAL SERVICES

Food Theft

Food theft from the Culinary is a major problem for the Institution. It impacts our ability to ensure adequate portions of the published menu are available, jeopardizes the health of individuals taking perishable food that is not being properly stored or cooked. It also has a significant effect on our ability to work within our food service budget.

This notice constitutes a direct order that you are not to take any food items from the Kitchen other than uncut fruit in the quantity served (per your Inmate Handbook). The following plan was designed to address this issue in a reasonable, consistent way.

- 1. If an AIC is caught stealing, or attempting to steal food, the food will be confiscated and disposed of accordingly. If the value of the food is less than \$20, the AIC will be issued a minor misconduct report. The minor misconduct report will be for disobedience of an Order III and will include the cost of all food items that must be disposed of due to the theft/attempted theft or misuse. If the value of the food is \$20 or more, the AIC will receive a major misconduct for Contraband II, and will also be charged for the cost of food that must be disposed of.
- 2. If the AIC stealing the food is assigned to the Kitchen or Dining Room, they will receive a program failure along with the Misconduct Report.
- This process will be used for foodstuff found outside the Culinary Section (for example cell searches, etc.) if the items can reasonably be determined to have been taken from the Food Services.

Note: This does not prevent a staff member from issuing a misconduct report for a higher level charge (Contraband II) in the event the AIC has received a recent minor misconduct previously for the same conduct.

MHI Unit ADL/Peer Companion Position Announcement

We believe that inmates who have proven to be successful in the prison community can provide a valuable resource to peers within that community. By listening to and mentoring peers who are struggling with various disabilities, Peer Companions can help teach them how to more effectively and productively manage their own responses to their environment.

Mental Health Special Housing is now hiring for two, full-time ADL/Peer Companions on the Mental Health Infirmary (MHI) unit. The Individuals selected for this position will report to the MHI unit for their shifts. We are looking for motivated, responsible individuals who have the willingness to work with individuals unable to care for their own ADL's as well as individuals experiencing significant mental health symptoms. It is important for Unit Peer Companion candidates to behave in a manner that is respectful, safe, confidential, and honest; modeling patience, respectful communication, and the following of all unit and institution rules.

MHI Unit ADL/Peer Companions will have specific shifts and are responsible for assisting unit staff, QMHP's and treatment staff in ensuring that identified inmates housed on MHI are getting their basic and daily needs met, which helps to improve their functioning and improve their overall quality of life while incarcerated.

Duties may also include assisting individuals around ADL coaching and skill building; increasing social interactions; and guiding or accompanying individuals who have difficulty walking or who are resistant to engaging in activities outside of their cells to activities on the unit, during day room, or out for MHI yard time.
